# STRIKING THE PERFECT BALANCE

After downsizing to a smaller home, Judith Meager decided to extend

aving lived in Sandymount,
Dublin, for many years, Judith
had grown to love the area,
but after downsizing to a small
Victorian terraced house from
a five-bedroom property, she
was eager to create more space.
'This place has lovely period
features and good-sized rooms,
but the kitchen really let it down,' she recalls. 'It was dark,
with limited light, there was very little workspace and it
had no connection with the garden, except through
an unattractive lean-to extension. However, since the
garden was a good size, I was confident there was
potential to extend out and to the side.'

Judith turned to architect David Leyden, who had been recommended by a friend, to come up with a design. She hoped to retain the charm and period features of the existing reception rooms, while adding a large, sociable space that incorporated the kitchen, dining and living areas to the rear of the house, all linked to the garden. I have regular visits from my children and grandchildren so this had to be a really functional space, she says. With the opportunity to drastically transform the rear of the house, David came up with an innovative, contemporary design that spanned boundary to boundary, but created an internal courtyard in part of the existing side return, allowing light to flood into the centre of the extension and providing a through-view from the front of the house to the garden.

Judith loved David's one-off ideas, so gave the plans the go-ahead straight away. Luckily, as the proposed design only meant extending 1.5 metres into the garden, it fell within permitted development and no planning permission was required. Judith then hired Marvel Restoration, who she'd found after searching locally, and moved out to rented accommodation nearby. 'The work involved removing the corner and back of the house, including the old lean-to,' she explains. 'I knew it would be a major upheaval, as I would have no working kitchen, so it was sensible to move out.' Once the foundations for the addition were in, the rest of the structure was built without any issues, including the installation of full-height glazed panels to form the new courtyard, which co-ordinate with the glazing at the rear.

After seven months, the extension was complete and a new, in-frame style kitchen was installed. Supplied by Shannonside Kitchens, the painted blue and grey design was made to measure, so perfectly suits the space. 'Positioning the central island looking onto the courtyard means I can enjoy the outside space while I'm busy in the kitchen,' says Judith. 'I worked with the kitchen designers to make sure the ergonomics were right and everything is positioned so it's close at hand.' With her love of classic design, Judith's choice of finishing touches includes white marble countertops and wooden flooring.

When it came to the rest of the décor, Judith kept everything neutral, allowing the blue island to pop. 'Right from the start, my aim for this space was to have it as light as possible,' she says. 'I have some Mid-century furniture that is quite dark so by keeping the rest of the colour scheme simple, it stills feels bright and modern.'

Now it's finished, Judith is thrilled with how the extended and remodelled space turned out. 'Thanks to David's wonderful design, it's so light and warm in here and the sense of space is so uplifting,' she adds. 'It's now the perfectly sized hub of the house.'
